Recommended Action: That Vulcan County meet with The Village of Lomond and The Village of Milo to discuss their Community Growth Initiative proposal.

Background & Proposal

On November 27, 2024, Vulcan County received a Community Growth Initiative proposal from the Village of Lomond and the Village of Milo. The proposal aims to address and ensure the continuation of postal services within their respective communities.

The Intermunicipal Development Plans (IDPs) under Section 3.5.10 previously identified Community Growth Initiative proposals as items for County consideration:

The County and Village agree to meet to discuss projects proposed by the Village intended to promote municipal viability and community growth. Project proposals identified by the Village as Community Growth Initiatives must include a written request to the County describing the proposed initiative, how a specific service need will be met and provide rationale for equitable cost-sharing of the growth initiative between the County and the Village for operating and/or capital expenses.

Additionally, the provision of Postal Service has also been referenced within the Village of Milo – Vulcan County Intermunicipal Collaboration Framework Agreement (ICF):

Postal Service

The Village of Milo is a dealer operator for Canada Post and provides postal service to residents in both the Village of Milo and Vulcan County. Based on the most recent audit of where postal box holders reside, approximately forty percent live in the Village of Milo and sixty percent live in Vulcan County. While this audit can be undertaken on a regular schedule, the Village of Milo incurs all costs associated with this service.

The Village of Milo believes that its postal service constitutes a Community Growth Initiative, as defined by the Intermunicipal Development Plan. The municipalities agree to discuss a written request to the County describing the proposed initiative, how a specific service need will be met and provide rationale for equitable cost-sharing of the growth initiative between the County and the Village for operating and/or capital expenses.

To ensure compliance with the County's Intermunicipal Development Plans and Intermunicipal Collaborative Framework Agreements, Administration recommends that Vulcan County meet with the Villages of Lomond and Milo to discuss the proposal in detail.

To streamline the process and have a manageable and effective discussion group, Council is encouraged to appoint specific representatives to attend the meeting on behalf of Vulcan County.


We appreciate your consideration of this matter. Time is somewhat of the essence given the approaching deadline of one of our stakeholders with Canada Post.

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Project Proposal

INTRODUCTION

The Intermunicipal Development Plans that were entered into between Vulcan County and the Villages of Lomond and Milo established the concept of a "Community Growth Initiative." Community Growth Initiatives are one form of collaboration between municipal partners in our region. Such initiatives may depart from the traditional purview of shared services to address a community specific need, for a common intermunicipal objective, and with collaborative support across municipal boundaries. These initiatives are unique to the needs of each community and should be proposed by the urban municipality where they believe a service gap exists, one that should be discussed and potentially addressed through collaboration with Vulcan County. All effected municipal partners, those whose residents might benefit from a new shared service that has not otherwise occurred in the past, should meet in good faith to discuss proposed initiatives and work towards common ground, if possible. While one village might believe that a certain service is required for the growth and development of a shared community with Vulcan County, another village might propose an entirely different initiative.

The following is a joint proposal by the Villages of Lomond and Milo to collaboratively partner with Vulcan County. The common intermunicipal objective would be to see that their respective communities have access to a local post office, one that is supported, in part, through intermunicipal collaboration. Lomond and Milo believe that access to a local post office has community development significance in rural areas, and that post office access should be considered when municipal partners weigh different strategies regarding population growth and economic development in our region.

Project Proposal

1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Villages of Lomond and Milo are proposing that Vulcan County collaborate with them on a Community Growth Initiative for post office service in their communities over a three-year trial period. While two scenarios are proposed for consideration, Lomond and Milo are open to discussing alternative scenarios that Vulcan County would like to bring forward.

The following proposal recognizes the unique nature of post office service delivery in the Lomond and Milo relative to other communities in Vulcan County. An overview is provided of the ways municipal support for post office service has already occurred in the communities of Arrowwood and Milo. The proposal recognizes that the post office service in Lomond and Milo is impacted by a significant revenue shortfall that dealer-operators have been unable to effectively curb.

It is recognized in this proposal that Canada Post is currently under pressure to make significant organizational change. The Villages of Lomond and Milo believe that the support of local government will be necessary to maintain access to post office service in their communities, for their residents and those of Vulcan County, at least until a significant reorganization of mail and parcel delivery occurs. The need for local access to a post office remains essential for residents and commercial interests operating in the Lomond and Milo districts, as well as for the viability of these villages.

It has long been the mandate of Vulcan County to develop and maintain safe and viable communities outside of the Town of Vulcan. While the County was initially formed to build modern schools and road networks sooner than otherwise would have been possible, a wide pallet of shared services now exists. Our region has benefited from healthy intermunicipal collaboration. The historic Villages of Arrowwood, Carmangay, Champion, Lomond and Milo should be valued as unique municipal partners, relative to the Town of the Vulcan, that continue to be five points of leverage with the Province of Alberta for the development of our region. The villages remain viable urban hubs for residential and commercial growth.

The Appendix provides written submissions that were given by community members in Lomond and Milo regarding the importance of local post office access.

Project Proposal

2. POST OFFICES IN VULCAN COUNTY

Running north-south on Highway 23, Canada Post continues to staff and operate a full-service post office in the Town of Vulcan, the Village of Champion and the Village of Carmangay. The Hamlet of Mossleigh is the one exception. The service population for these three post offices is approximately, 2700 urban and 1800 rural, or a total population of maybe 4,500 residents.

Mossleigh is only a ten-minute drive away from a full-service post office in the Village of Arrowwood on Highway 547. Combined, the service population for the Northwest District of Vulcan County and the Village of Arrowwood is approximately 800 residents. The post office in Arrowwood is unique in Vulcan County to the extent that it remains a "postmaster-owned" operation. This means that Canada Post employs the postmaster as a Canada Post employee and will pay approximately \$300 per month for a secure post office space with telephone, internet and basic utilities. Over the past decade, the Arrowwood Community has rallied behind this postmaster-owned post office when Canada Post decided that the historic location it occupied on Centre Street was not suitable.

When this occurred, the Arrowwood Co-op stepped up to plate and offered space in the office area of its old tire shop for the nominal <\$300 per month rent. The postmaster, Terri Gooch, along with her husband Gord, then invested significant dollars and resources of their own to renovate the space and secure it as a post office. This was a very congested post office that served its purpose for several years, however, the growth and development of the Co-op and the Village eventually determined that the old tire shop location would no longer work either. For the Co-op, more space was required for its own operation and employee parking. The Village of Arrowwood, on the other hand, sought to resolve ongoing congestion of parked vehicles in front of residential lots being sold for new development.

With these motivations in mind, the Village of Arrowwood recognized two objectives:

- 1. Find a new space for the post office when available options were very few.
- 2. Avoid the fate of Milo and Lomond by keeping the postmaster-owned service.

The Village of Arrowwood successfully entered a ten-year Memorandum of Understanding with Cor-Lan Developments, the owner of the Arrowwood Mall, to secure a newly renovated post office for the community. Upon entering a Memorandum of Understanding, the Village sold two lots around the mall to Cor-Lan Developments at a 33% discounted price from assessed value, as well as agreeing to purchase a new counter and sign for the new post office space. At no additional cost, Cor-Lan Developments then constructed the post office in conjunction with their development of a surveillance suite, medical practitioner accommodation, and pharmacy expansion. For a one-time municipal contribution of approximately \$10,000 in value, the Village was able to secure a superior location for the postmaster-owned service and Cor-Lan Developments has supported its new tenant for the low monthly rent that Canada Post is willing to pay.

3. POST OFFICE SERVICE IN LOMOND & MILO

The communities of Lomond and Milo, the eastern side of Vulcan County, have a service population of approximately 1700, with significant development potential given their proximity to the irrigation reservoirs and existing country residential developments. While residents of these areas may go to Vulcan for certain goods and services, many do not. Residents in these areas are frequently drawn towards Picture Butte, Lethbridge and Coaldale, or Brooks, Bassano, Strathmore and High River/Okotoks for business and personal needs. For many, the difference in distance between going to one of these locations versus travelling to Vulcan has proven to be negligible given their own priorities. Consequently, access to a full-service post office has been recognized by many community members in Lomond and Milo as essential for their day-to-day needs. While seniors rely on this service for their medications, local access to parcel pick-up and shipping is a significantly growing priority relative to letter mail.

When Canada Post ceased to operate a full-service post office in Lomond in the 1990s, successive owners of the hardware (which is now S&S Grocery), agreed to offer in-store post office service for the community. Similarly, when the postmaster-owned post office in Milo ceased operation, Jamie's AG Foods did a small addition on their building and began operating as a dealer for Canada Post. The grocery stores in Lomond and Milo hoped the post office might be slightly profitable at best, or a moderate overall loss leader for their business. Given the staffing required to operate this service, profitability has proven unrealistic, being a significant net drain while not generating sufficient revenue.

Over fifteen years ago, after the last Canada Post dealer in Milo was suddenly closed, the Village of Milo intervened and agreed to become the dealer for Canada Post. Over the intervening years, the Village has subsidized this service for the entire community while trying to justify the additional staffing needs with some complementary role for municipal operations. In certain years, post office revenue has run short of expenses by approximately \$17,000 per year, while the Village of Milo has outlaid significant capital dollars to renovate two locations as a full-service post office for the community.

Since 2018, the Village of Milo has reduced post office hours and worked diligently to try to contain its loss on the post office. Likewise, S&S Grocery has determined that they have lost approximately \$78,000.00 over a thirteen-year period providing post office service to the Lomond Community. In the summer of 2024, after much frustration and asking Canada Post for an additional \$500 per month, S&S Grocery gave notice that they would be surrendering their Canada Post dealership because they could no longer justify taking such a hit to their business operation. In response to community frustration, the Village of Lomond invited S&S Grocery and the Village of Milo to a meeting to determine if some other solution could be found that would not entail losing the local post office. Given his history with these matters, Christopher Northcott was invited as well and spoke about the recognition of Community Growth Initiatives in the Intermunicipal Development Plans.

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4. **REVENUE SHORTFALL**

As stated above, the Village of Lomond has learned that their local post office dealer, S&S Grocery, lost approximately \$78,000.00 over a thirteen-year period. A more thorough accounting for staff resources and additional business inputs will drive this number higher. This corroborates the experience of the Village of Milo that provides a post office as one service of local government. In some years, the village has subsidized the post office to the tune of approximately \$17,000.00, being significantly higher in years where additional staff resources were applied. The impacts to the village's capital budget have also been significant when building renovation and enhancement was required. Most recently, the Village of Milo incurred a \$10,108.00 shortfall in 2023 operating revenue for this service.

The Villages of Lomond and Milo believe that a dealer-operated post office in their communities requires a subsidy of between \$6,000 and \$10,000 just to operate. This does not include capital outlays for building additions or improvements required to secure the post office space and allow for business operations.

Milo's revenue versus expenses are as follows:



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The following is an email from Lomond's post office dealer to Canada Post representatives explaining her frustration and why a thirty-year service agreement requires an update to cover unavoidable costs.

This is an e-mail just so you are informed and maybe Canada Post can do better for the small businesses that are trying to provide your service with mail and parcels to your customers.

I hope you realise the devastation that this will cause this community with out us providing postal service. We have a lot of elderly and people who do not drive and receive medication and food through the postal service. People are very angry and not at me.

We have provided your service at our cost for years. Our contract has not been updated in 13 years and its the same contract as the previous owners and the ones before them. We asked for a renewal of contract so that it covers your costs of operation. It should not cost our business out of pocket to provide your service. We have to hire staff to place your letter mail in a total different building then where we have the parcels. That costs me \$900-1000.00 a month and more if your trucks are not on schedule and we have to wait for it to arrive. The parcel load is high and is a lot of work to get them delivered to your customers. We also have to pay for your Equipments supplies. \$168 for bar code labels, all receipt paper and even the ink that goes in your printer at \$160.00. This is for your equipment not mine and we are given \$17.00 a month to cover that. Doesn't come close.

We also asked for the route to be done backwards putting us first as our loads are double what anyone else gets and we need time to sort it. Lomond does not care about cut off times being earlier. They prefer to get their mail at a decent time not at the end of the day. It was changed for a couple month and it worked perfect for us. until Arrowood felt that they are corporate so they go first. Delivering here at noon to 1 pm puts your driver and my staff at risk as there is no parking and they have to stop on the road to unload. It interrupts our lunch rush and also my other trucks like grocery that have to be unloaded first as there is perishable food on it. In 2 separate occasions the girls were almost hit from traffic. very unsafe. I was told this route can not be changed but i also know it can very easily. Since we have given our resignation I understand you are putting in super boxes. This will cost you thousands of dollars and the excess will have to go to Vulcan. Vulcan is now going to have to hire an extra staff member to compensate for Lomond's mail. They will also have to hire someone to pick up the mail in Vulcan and bring it to Lomond, load boxes and return with out going mail. That alone will cost more a week than we received per month. would have been cheaper to redo our contract. You were on the news the other day saying Canada post is going broke and needs to up prices. sounds like upper levels are mismanaging costs.

You could have saved thousands of dollars just by working with me rather than against me. Good luck with taking over Lomond's mail and sorry Amber for the added Christmas stress. If you ever reconsider my door is open for discussion. If not good luck with your decision.

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5. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT SIGNIFICANCE

Rural communities have long relied on developing small-scale and community specific strategies to promote enhanced services, population growth, or economic activity. In some instances, these strategies can be developed, organized, and implemented by volunteers. Many communities, for instance, rely on volunteers to provide a courtesy car for seniors, or give of their own time and money to privately form development co-operatives that build and maintain a restaurant facility. While volunteer initiatives are critical and should be encouraged whenever possible, there are some initiatives that are better suited for local government to lead and support. This is usually the case when the initiative is for a service that impacts <u>all members of a community</u> and <u>where ongoing subsidization is required</u>.

As set out in section 3 of the Municipal Government Act of Alberta, the purposes of a municipal corporation are as follows:

"(a) to provide good government,

(a.1) to foster the well-being of the environment,

(a.2) to foster the economic development of the municipality,

(b) to provide services, facilities or other things that, in the

opinion of council, are necessary or desirable for all or a

part of the municipality,

(c) to develop and maintain safe and viable communities, and

(d) to work collaboratively with neighbouring municipalities to

plan, deliver and fund intermunicipal services."

Additionally, about eight years ago the Province of Alberta amended the Municipal Government Act to mandate intermunicipal collaboration on shared services. The province now requires municipalities to agree upon Intermunicipal Collaboration Frameworks. As outlined in section 708.27 of the Municipal Government Act of Alberta, the purpose of Part 17.2 of the Act "... is to provide for intermunicipal collaboration frameworks among 2 or more municipalities

(a) to provide for the integrated and strategic planning, delivery and funding of intermunicipal services,

(b) to steward scarce resources efficiently in providing local services, and

(c) to ensure municipalities contribute funding to services that benefit their residents.

2016 c24 s134;2019 c22 s10(28)"

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In 2020, Municipal Affairs issued version 3 of its workbook on Intermunicipal Collaboration Frameworks. This document outlines five categories of shared services between municipalities to help conceptualize the development process of a framework. These categories are transportation, emergency services, water/wastewater, solid waste and recreation (p. 14). The following, however, is also recognized that "...beyond the five service categories..." the framework "... should also include any service delivery that your municipality may like to explore as part of the ICF process."

With the above in mind, municipal partners in Vulcan County established the concept of a "**Community Growth Initiative**" in the Intermunicipal Development Plan between the Village of Lomond and Vulcan County, as well as that between the Village of Milo and Vulcan County. In both plans, section 3.5.10 sets out the following:

"The County and Village agree to meet to discuss projects proposed by the Village intended to promote municipal viability and community growth. Project proposals identified by the Village as Community Growth Initiatives must include a written request to the County describing the proposed initiative, how a specific service need will be met and provide rationale for equitable cost-sharing of the growth initiative between the County and the Village for operating and/or capital expenses."

In the discussions that informed the inclusion of Community Growth Initiatives in these statutory plans, it was understood that such initiatives could be uniquely tailored for the needs of each community in Vulcan County. Being established by statutory plan for fostering collaboration between two municipalities, it was understood that Community Growth Initiatives would apply to shared services that benefit the residents of both jurisdictions.

<u>The Village of Lomond and the Village of Milo are jointly requesting that Vulcan County consider</u> the following proposed Community Growth Initiative for providing post office service in their communities. They understand that this is likely not a concern for any other village or town in our region, however, they can appreciate that other communities might have a unique service gap that could be considered as a Community Growth Initiative. The councils for the Villages of Lomond and Milo recognize that another urban municipality located in Vulcan County could propose some other project for consideration as a Community Growth Initiative. The village councils believe that Community Growth Initiatives could be a net benefit for our region as we work collectively to promote economic development and community growth, and do so with our rural municipal partner, Vulcan County, in a manner that best suits the needs of each community.

Canada Post is widely seen to be at a crossroads where significant organizational change is soon necessary. Every community in Canada relies on Canada Post in one form or another, and post office outlets remain essential in rural communities by making commercial and business transactions easier, providing access to healthcare for seniors and those otherwise challenged by having to travel. Rural communities remain vibrant by maintaining community and commercial activities that bring people to town and attract newcomers looking for a new home. It should also be recognized that many residents now do a lot of online shopping with fast delivery that was not as widely available in the past.

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The advent of online shopping has made access to certain goods and services—even parts for farm machinery—more readily available in rural communities. This is greatly appreciated in communities where distance and travel can cause significant inconvenience.

If the post offices in Milo and Lomond were to close, certain services would only be accessible in the Town of Vulcan. Those expecting registered mail, or anything requiring a signature, would be expected to travel to Vulcan to collect it. This is a significant inconvenience for anyone living east of Milo or Lomond, and especially when they might not be traveling to Vulcan for any other reason on a regular basis. The development of Vulcan County's own country-residential developments in these communities is also supported by having easier access to post office service in Milo and Lomond. Anyone having to commute further away, say Calgary or Lethbridge, could find it very challenging to find the time required to go to Vulcan to get to the post office. The Villages of Lomond and Milo believe that we should be encouraging commuters to live in their districts as one strategy for economic development and community growth.

Given the organizational challenges of Canada Post, the Villages of Lomond and Milo believe that any consideration of a Community Growth Initiative for postal service should be based on a threeyear term, with a service review occurring after year two. Mail and parcel delivery beyond the services of Canada Post remains a challenge for rural communities, one that all residents are presently finding out given the challenge posed to alternative carriers during a postal strike. Ongoing dialogue between municipal partners will be necessary as we navigate changes to postal service and rural parcel delivery.

Consider the following excerpt from the 2023 Annual Report for Canada Post:

"An outdated postal system will affect all Canadians, but it will be felt most by those who need it most small businesses as well as Canadians in rural and remote areas. The postal service is a vital national infrastructure built to serve the entire country, but it is at a difficult crossroads that challenges its very future and relevance.

Change is needed to ensure the postal service is there for all Canadians, especially rural and remote communities and small businesses. In today's competitive environment, rural remote and northern communities, with their lower population densities and distance from large urban centres, are costly to deliver to. Canada Post has always been there to serve these communities, delivering a much higher proportion of parcels in rural and remote areas. We're proud to fulfill this need. But without change, our financial situation will impact our ability to continue to serve these important communities." (p. 8)

While we are in a time of significant change for Canada Post, the Villages of Lomond and Milo believe that local government can collaboratively continue to assist their communities, supporting local post office access under the mandate established for municipalities by the Province of Alberta.

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6. MUNICIPAL SUPPORT – SCENARIO ONE

Over a three-year trial period, Vulcan County will partner with the Village of Lomond and the Village of Milo to provide funding support for post office service in the communities of Lomond and Milo.

This funding support is to cover an established and calculated shortfall of mutually agreed upon post office revenue from mutually agreed upon post office expenses.

- In conjunction with authorized post office personnel, municipal representatives from Vulcan County and either the Village of Lomond or the Village of Milo will do an annual count of how many boxes are held by village residents and how many are held by county residents. This annual count will exclude boxes held by non-profit and community groups.
- Evidence of a revenue short-fall will be provided to the municipal partners and the service provider will be reimbursed to the extent they have provided a subsidized service for village and county residents.
- 3. Each municipal partner will pay their respective share of the revenue shortfall from expenses.
- 4. The municipal partners will undertake a comprehensive program review after two years, determining whether this municipal support for post office service should continue beyond year three.

7. MUNICIPAL SUPPORT – SCENARIO TWO

Over a three-year trial period, Vulcan County will partner with the Village of Lomond and the Village of Milo to provide funding support for post office service in the communities of Lomond and Milo. This funding support will be a fixed postal service operating grant from Vulcan County to their urban municipal partner of \$6,000 on year 1, \$6,250 on year 2, and \$6,500 on year three.

- 1. The Village of Lomond will transfer the operating grant from Vulcan County to S&S Grocery, along with any additional funding or operational support that they can offer.
- 2. The Village of Milo will accept the operating grant from Vulcan County on behalf of the County ratepayers who use their service and continue to subsidize post office service for all residents.
- 3. The municipal partners will undertake a comprehensive program review after two years and determine whether municipal support for post office service should continue beyond year three.

To Whom It May Concern

I am writing this letter concerning keeping the post office service in Lomond. This service is vital to the Lomond Community.

I will have to get stamps, mail parcels, etc., somewhere else. How do you run a business without a full service post office? We already have all of this in Lomond and it is working very well.

I have been told that the reason for shutting down the Lomond Post Office is all about saving money. How much is the cost of the super boxes? What is the maintenance cost of the super boxes? What is the person delivering and sorting the mail getting paid? What is the person delivering parcels and putting them in the super boxes getting paid? (I suspect not enough. Other communities, like Enchant, can't keep an employee to do this. They now get delivery twice a week, not every day).

I would bet that since Canada Post as already publicly announced that they will be broke by 2025, that we will get multiple excuses why the boxes are not being installed. I do not believe that this service is a benefit to our community in any way, anyway.

I have talked to several people that will move their mail service elsewhere. We will also move ours if we lose full service. The problem is this ... we changed our box number 13 years ago, and we still get mail at the old box number. I have been told that that won't happen if we have a different postal code. There

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is no way to change our address with all of the people we do business with. It will take years to get it done. I see the changes to the post office as just one more nail in Lomond's coffin. If people go elsewhere for the mail, they will not be supporting the other business either.

Sandra Kam and her crew have done an amazing job of serving the community, for the last 13 years, as the Post Office. I think that we will all benefit from her continuing to do this.
